Dear Families,

The Year 6 or Year 5/6 classes at your child's school will be visited by Fire Rescue Victoria (FRV) firefighters soon.

The visit is part of FRV's commitment to making our community more fire safe. The firefighters will be working with the teachers to deliver the <u>Fire Ed for Upper Primary</u> program. This program provides students with important home fire safety information.

What can you do?

Group Research Projects

The students have been working hard on fire safety projects and have been researching:

- home fire prevention
- smoke alarms
- home fire escape planning
- fire science
- summer fire safety
- roles of firefighters.

Please support your child's research and project work.

The student groups will be displaying and sharing their work with the firefighters during their visit to your school.

Children and Fire

Some children have had experience with a house fire or have been injured in a fire. If this is the case with your child, please discuss this with their teacher. This information will be passed on to firefighters, to be taken into account during visits.

Please read the following information and follow the links to access home and bush/grass fire safety information for your family.

Check your Smoke Alarms

Home fire safety starts with working smoke alarms.

- Home smoke alarms are compulsory.
- They provide early warning of a fire and give you time to escape.
- You should have at least one on every level of your home.



- FRV recommends long life lithium battery smoke alarms be installed in all living rooms, hallways and bedrooms.
- Test them every month by pressing the test button.
- If you have a smoke alarm with a 9-volt battery, replace the battery every year.
- Replace all smoke alarms every 10 years.

Create and Practice a Home Fire Escape Plan Know what to do if you experience a home fire.

- Know the quickest, safest way to escape from every room, including the upper floors.
- Agree on a safe place to meet outside.
- Make sure your street number is visible so emergency services can find you quickly.
- Practice your home fire escape plan with all the people you live with.
- Keep your exits clear.
- Always leave keys in locked doors and security screens when you are inside.
- If you live in a high-rise building, know where the fire exits are and always take the stairs.



If a fire starts:

 Crawl down low and stay out of the smoke



Alert other people on your way out If safe to do so, close doors as you exit

Children and Fire Safety

There is a lot you can do to protect your family and your home from fire.

- The kitchen is the room where most home fires start - always supervise children in the kitchen
- Use a screen around fireplaces children should be supervised near heaters and open fires
- Keep lighters, matches, candles, incense and oil burners out of reach of children.
- Store chemical products safely away from ignition sources and out of reach of children.
